### THIS WEEK

The Rams finished the 2006 season with a three game winning streak and hope to carry that momentum into head coach Scott Linehan's second season as the team opens the regular season this week with a home game against the Carolina Panthers at the Edward Jones Dome. This will be the second consecutive year that the Rams have opened at home, defeating Denver, 18-10, last season to give Linehan his first career victory.

In that game, K Jeff Wilkins set a Rams' record by making six of seven field goal attempts (26, 38, 29, 51, 48 and 24 yards, missing from 44 yards.) The seven attempts tied a Rams record, while the six made field goals established a Rams record. The six field goals also tied for the second-most in one game in NFL history, while the seven attempts tied for third most in NFL history.

The Rams will enter the 2007 season led by nine team captains. The captains for this year are K Jeff Wilkins, S Corey Chavous, LB Will Witherspoon, DT La'Roi Glover, LB Pisa Tinoisamoa QB Marc Bulger, WR Isaac Bruce, WR Torry Holt and RB Steven Jackson.

The Rams season opening game versus Carolina marks the first time that the Rams and Panthers have faced each other in the opening weekend. This week's contest will be a rematch of last season's 15-0 loss to the Panthers at Bank of America Stadium in Week 11. The Panthers lead the all-time series against the Rams, 10-7.

### 2007 KICKOFF WEEKEND NOTABLES

- The **Rams** own a 38-31 opening game record, winning eight of the last 12 openers they've played since moving to St. Louis in 1995, and 10 of their past 15 overall. Their .551 opening day winning percentage is the sixth-best in the NFC.
- The **Rams** need two regular season victories to reach 500. The team's all-time regular season record is 498-441-20.
- The **Rams** travel 34,352 miles during the 2007 season, the most in the NFL...St. Louis will be one of five teams (Rams, Seahawks, Chargers, Raiders and Cardinals) to "travel around the world" at least once. A trip around the globe is 25,000 miles...the 34,352 miles the Rams travel during the season is 12,822 miles more than the team traveled last year.
- **QB Marc Bulger** owns the fifth-best starting record among active quarterbacks in the NFC (12th in the NFL) with a minimum of 10 starts. He is 36-24 with a .600 winning percentage, trailing fellow NFC quarterbacks Rex Grossman (17-6, .739), Kyle Orton (10-5, .667); Donovan McNabb (65-33, .663), and Brett Favre (147-90, .620).
- Fifty-six years later, former Ram **Norm Van Brocklin** still holds the record for the highest single-game passing total in NFL history. In the Rams' 1951 season-opener against the New York Yanks on Sept. 28, 1951, Van Brocklin completed 27 of 41 passes for 554 yards and a team-record tying five touchdown passes as the Rams defeated the Yanks 54-14 at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The Hall of Fame signal caller, who also ran for a touchdown in the game, led the Rams to a standing NFL single-game record 735 total yards and a then-team record 34 first downs.

## **THE HEAD COACHES**

**SCOTT LINEHAN** (2nd season as head coach, 2nd with Rams; Career Record: 8-8) – Named twenty-second head coach in franchise history by Owner/Chairman Georgia Frontiere on January 19, 2006. Linehan rallied the Rams to an 8-8 finish in his first season. Quarterback Marc Bulger enjoyed the best season of his career, including 4,301 yards passing and 24 touchdowns. Balancing the offensive attack, Linehan guided Steven Jackson to lead the league with 2,334 combined yards, and set a Rams running back record with 90 catches. Prior to joining the Rams, Linehan was the offensive coordinator of the Miami Dolphins; the Dolphins improved from 29th in 2004 to 14th in total offensive in 2005. Linehan spent three seasons (2002-2004) as offensive coordinator for the Minnesota Vikings. In 2004, Daunte Culpepper posted the fourth-highest single season passer rating in NFL history (110.9). A college quarterback, Linehan was a free agent signee with the Dallas Cowboys before a shoulder injury ended his active career.

**JOHN FOX** (6th season as head coach, 6th with Panthers; Career Record: 49-38) – Became third coach in Carolina Panthers history on January 25, 2002. During tenure from 2002-06, 49 overall victories stand as the third-highest total in NFC and seventh-highest amount in the NFL. Since arrival in 2002, Panthers are one of five teams that have ranked among the NFL's top 10 in total defense in at least four of the last five seasons and rank second in NFL with 161 takeaways and fourth with 96 interceptions. In 2005, directed team to second NFC championship appearance in three seasons. In 2003, guided Panthers to Super Bowl XXXVIII two years after inheriting team that won one game in 2001. Joined Vince Lombardi and Bill Parcells as the only coaches in NFL history to inherit a one-win team and guide it to the playoffs in their second season. Prior to joining Carolina he served as the defensive coordinator for the N.Y. Giants (1997-2001). Before joining the Giants, Fox was a consultant for the Rams (1996), defensive coordinator for the Raiders (1994-95), defensive backs coach for the Chargers (1992-93) and Steelers (1989-1991), and secondary coach for the USFL's Los Angeles Express (1985).

## **THE LAST TIME**

### **Bank of America Stadium, November 19, 2006**

**(73,348)** – The Rams suffered their first shutout since 1998 in a 15-0 loss to the Carolina Panthers, dropping them to 4-6 for the season. QB Marc Bulger passed for 142 yards, breaking his tie with QB Kurt Warner (14,447) for fourth place on the Rams' all-time passing yards list with 14,589 yards. RB Steven Jackson gained 57 yards from scrimmage, totaling 3,521 for his career, passing RB Jim Bertelsen (3,480) and RB Cleveland Gary (3,489) for 24th on the Rams' all-time scrimmage yards list. The Rams' defense recorded two interceptions, five forced fumbles, recovered one fumble, and had 3.0 sacks for 22 yards. DT La'Roi Glover had 2.0 sacks for 22 yards. DE Leonard Little recorded 1.0 sack. S Oshiomogho Atogwe added two forced fumbles, and S Jerome Carter and rookie CB Tye Hill each recorded their second career interceptions.

## **BULGER vs. DELHOMME**

Neither Rams QB Marc Bulger nor Panthers QB Jake Delhomme entered the league as a big name prospect, but both have gone on to have Pro Bowl caliber success in the NFL. Bulger was named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad after the 2003 and 2006 seasons, while Delhomme joined the NFC squad after the 2005 season.

Bulger is entering his sixth year as the Rams starting quarterback, while Delhomme is entering his fifth year in the same role for Carolina. Bulger had the luxury of being former MVP Kurt Warner's understudy in St. Louis for two seasons, while Delhomme backed up the former Rams signal caller as a member of NFL Europe's Amsterdam Admirals in 1998. Over the past two seasons, Holt, a six-time Pro-Bowler, has recorded more receptions than any other receiver in the league.

### **Rams, National City Looking for Breast Cancer Survivors**

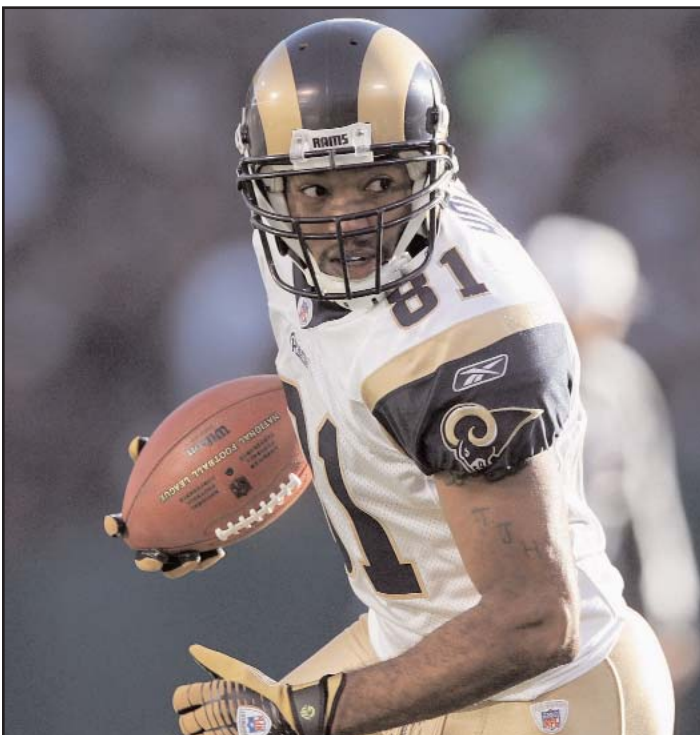
The Rams and National City are teaming up to honor breast cancer survivors at halftime of the October 7 game versus the Arizona Cardinals.

## **NEW FACES JOIN RAMS STAFF**

**Mike Cox (Defensive Quality Control/Assistant Defensive Line)** – Cox joins the Rams after spending nearly 20 years at the collegiate level, including 17 seasons under the tutelage of former collegiate head coach John L. Smith. A four-time letterman at Idaho and a three-year starter at linebacker, Cox landed his first coaching position with his alma mater, where he spent eight seasons (1987-1994) as linebackers coach. Upon Smith's departure following the 1994 season, Cox followed his mentor to his next three stops, including a three season stint with Utah State (1995-1997), five seasons with Louisville (1998-2002) and five seasons with Michigan State (2002-2006), handling the linebackers at each spot while also serving as recruiting coordinator at Michigan State. In 2000, Louisville forced an NCAA-best 37 turnovers and in 2002 Louisville ranked among the NCAA leaders in rushing defense. As a player at Idaho, Cox recorded 252 tackles, which still ranks among the Vandals' all-time leaders.

**Keith Murphy (Offensive Quality Control)** – Murphy comes to the Rams after eight seasons coaching wide receivers and special teams at Eastern Washington University. A former wide receiver at the University of Washington, Murphy worked with receivers, quarterbacks and special teams as a graduate assistant with his alma mater under Scott Linehan for three seasons (1997-1999) after spending the 1996 campaign working with the running backs and special teams as a Huskies student assistant. During his five-year career as a player, Murphy was part of two Pac-10 Conference champion teams, as well as five bowl teams.

**Al Roberts (Special Teams)** – After spending the past four years coaching and teaching on the high school level, Al Roberts joins the Rams as special teams coach, bringing with him 17 years of NFL experience. After playing college football at the University of Washington and the University of Puget Sound, Roberts began a coaching career that took him to a variety of stops on both the collegiate and professional levels. Roberts returned to the University of Washington in 1977 as running backs coach, where he spent six years (1977-1982) before moving to the USFL. Roberts served as both running backs and special teams coach for the Los Angeles Express in 1983 and 1984, then moved to the Houston Oilers (1984-1995), Purdue University (1986) and University of Wyoming (1987). Roberts returned to the NFL in 1988, making stops as special teams coach with the Philadelphia Eagles (1988-1990), New York Jets (1991-1993) and Arizona Cardinals (1994-1995). In 1996 Roberts returned to the University of Washington, coaching running backs and special teams for one year before again moving to the NFL as special teams coach with the Cincinnati Bengals (1997-2002). In 1999 the Bengals finished third in the NFL in both kickoff and punt returns, while Tremain Mack became the first Bengal to lead the AFC (27.1 avg.) in kickoff returns, as well as the first Cincinnati player to be named to the Pro Bowl as a kick return specialist.

## **NEW RAMS IN BLUE**

In the offseason, the Rams addressed offensive, defensive and special teams needs by adding several new faces to the team, including **WR Drew Bennett**, **WR/KR Dante Hall**, **DE James Hall** and **TE Randy McMichael**, all projected to make immediate impacts in 2007.

**Bennett**, who entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent, spent the previous six seasons with Tennessee where he led the team in receptions for the past two seasons, and in receiving yards for the past three seasons. In 2006, he nabbed 46 receptions for 737 yards. His career-high 16.0-yards-per-catch average ranked third in the AFC (seventh in the NFL) among receivers with at least 45 catches. He ranks eighth in Titans' franchise history with 4,033 receiving yards and ninth with 273 receptions. Bennett, along with Pro Bowl receivers Torry Holt and Isaac Bruce, could help form one of the more dynamic receiving units in the NFL.

**Dante Hall** is a two-time Pro Bowler who spent the past seven seasons in Kansas City. One of the most prolific kick returners in NFL history, Hall holds Chiefs records for career kickoff returns (360), kickoff return yards (8,644), special teams scores (11), kickoff return touchdowns (6), combined net yards (12,356) and career punt returns for touchdowns (5). His six kickoff returns for touchdowns are tied for first in NFL history and his 8,644 career kickoff return yards rank sixth in NFL history. In addition to his return talents, he also will fit into the Rams' receiving corps this season.

**James Hall** will add a boost to the pass defense. Hall comes to the Rams after playing for Detroit where he was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2000. In 2006, Hall was a team captain and tallied 5.0 sacks in seven games before being placed on the reserved/injured list with a shoulder injury. He earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors in Week 6 vs. Buffalo 10/15 with a season-high 3.0 sacks, eight tackles (five solo), and one forced fumble, the fifth career multiple-sack game of his career. Hall will team with Pro Bowl defensive end Leonard Little.

**McMichael** will add veteran leadership to a young and talented group of tight ends. After spending five years with Miami, he is the all-time leader among Miami tight ends with 283 receptions and 3,096 yards. He has started all 80 games in his NFL career, the third-longest streak by a Dolphin to open a career and second-longest in NFL history for a tight end behind Ozzie Newsome's 95 games. McMichael ranks fifth among active tight ends with 283 receptions going into 2007. Last season, he finished fifth among AFC tight ends in receptions (62) and sixth in receiving yards (640). McMichael led the Dolphins in receptions five times and receiving yards four times.

### **WILKINS vs. KASAY**

Over the past decade, K John Kasay of the Panthers and K Jeff Wilkins of the Rams have established themselves as two of the most dependable kickers in the NFL.

Among active players, Kasay ranks fourth on the career points list, with Wilkins less than 100 points behind in fifth place, despite playing in nearly 40 fewer games.

Both kickers have also proven to be reliable from long range, with Kasay connecting on 33 field goal attempts from 50 yards or longer, while Wilkins has converted 23 such attempts, good for second and fourth, respectively, among active kickers. A comparison of their career numbers:

DT La'Roi Glover and DE Leonard Little have been among the best in the NFL at sacking the quarterback. Glover enters his 12th year in the league this season, after finishing second on the team with 5.5 sacks in 2006. Little enters his 10th season in 2007, and led the team in sacks with 13.0 last season. Glover and Little rank ninth and 11th, respectively, on the NFL's career active sack leaders list. The Rams are the only team with two players in the top 11.

When Panthers DE Julius Peppers entered the league as the second overall pick of the 2002 NFL Draft, his combination of size and athleticism made him an immediate force, earning NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors in 2002.

Since making the transition from linebacker, DE Leonard Little has been one of the most consistent pass rushers in the game. After spending the early portion of his career at linebacker, Little moved to defensive end in 2001, posting 14.5 sacks in his first full season at his new position. ## WILKINS

K Jeff Wilkins returns in 2007 for his 11th season with the Rams. In 2006, Wilkins continued his strong performance on the field, leading the Rams in scoring for a team-record eighth consecutive season and finishing the year ranked third in the NFL in scoring with 131 points (35/35 PATs, 32/37 FGs).

Wilkins earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors during last season's opening weekend after he set a Rams' record by making six of seven field goal attempts (26, 38, 29, 51, 48 and 24 yards, missing from 44 yards.) against Denver (9/10/06). The seven attempts tied a Rams record set by Rich Karlis (at Minnesota, 11/5/89), while the six made field goals established a Rams record, passing Bob Waterfield (vs. Detroit, 12/9/51) and Wilkins' own performance against San Diego on Oct. 1, 2000. The six field goals also tied for the second-most in one game in NFL history, while the seven attempts tied for third most in NFL history.

Wilkins has converted 283 career field goals, which stands as the Rams' all-time mark and his 1,127 points make him the Rams' all-time scoring leader. Wilkins has shown a knack for hitting long-distance field goals, as he currently owns a Rams' record with 23 made field goals from at least 50 yards. The 23 field goals from at least 50 yards rank fourth among active players. Wilkins has made 32 of 42 field goal attempts from at least 49 yards.

Entering 2007, Wilkins has made a franchise-record 346 consecutive PATs, which ranks second in NFL history behind Jason Elam's streak of 371 consecutive extra point conversions from 1993-2002.

Wilkins currently ranks fifth among active NFL players in points scored, and his .825 field goal percentage is also fifth among active players.

### **THREE'S COMPANY**

WR Torry Holt and WR Isaac Bruce have been one of the NFL's most productive receiving tandems since first teaming up in 1999, but with the addition of free agent WR Drew Bennett, Rams QB Marc Bulger will have an outstanding trio of targets to throw to during the 2007 season.

In 2006, Holt recorded 1,188 receiving yards and 10 touchdowns on 93 receptions en route to his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl selection and sixth overall, while Bruce added 74 catches for 1,098 yards and three touchdowns. As a member of the Tennessee Titans last season, Bennett caught 46 balls for 737 yards and three touchdowns.

Had Bennett been with the Rams in 2006, their 213 total catches would have given Holt, Bruce and Bennett the most receptions among any three teammates in the NFL at wide receiver.

### **BRUCE ALMIGHTY**

WR Isaac Bruce enters his 14th season in the NFL in 2007 and has continued to produce at a high level throughout his career. Bruce, who has been with the Rams for his entire career, ranks first in Rams history with 887 receptions and 80 receiving touchdowns and stands second all-time with 10,675 receiving yards. Only current Rams' teammate Torry Holt has more receiving yards than Bruce. Bruce is the Ram's career leader in 100-yard receiving games (42), 1,000-yard receiving seasons (eight), postseason receiving yards (759) and is the only player in team history with four 100-yard receiving games in the postseason. He also holds Rams' single-season records for most receiving yards (1,781), most receptions (119), and most consecutive 100-yard receiving games (six).

In 2006, Bruce started 15 games and notched his eighth career 1,000-yard receiving season with 1,098 yards on 74 catches with three touchdowns. With his 25-yard reception on a Marc Bulger pass vs. Arizona in Week 13 (12/3/06), Bruce eclipsed the 13,000-yard mark for his career. He is one of only nine receivers to total 13,000 receiving yards, and was the third fastest to achieve that mark, reaching the milestone in 179 games.

Bruce's career numbers place him among the best receivers in NFL history. He ranks seventh on the NFL's all-time receptions list with 887 catches, seventh on the all-time receiving yards list with 13,376 receiving yards and is 18th on the league's all-time touchdown receptions list with 80 touchdowns. His 887 career receptions are more than any receiver currently enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

## **RUSHING A LITTLE...**

In his 10th season, DE Leonard Little looks to continue his dominance in 2007 after leading the team in sacks with 13.0 last year, his highest sack total since he posted a career-high 14.5 sacks in 2001. Little has led the team in sacks five of the last six years, tallying double-digit sack totals four times since 2001. Little was named to the Pro Bowl in 2004, after collecting 78 tackles (49 solo), 12.5 sacks, one interception, six forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With 74.0 career sacks, Little leads the Rams in sacks since the stat became official in 1982. There have been 40 quarterbacks that have been victims of Little, with QB Tim Rattay being sacked the most.

## **ON THE MARC**

In 2007, QB Marc Bulger looks to pick up where he left off last season, where he posted career numbers that led him to his second Pro Bowl appearance. Bulger finished last season with 370 completions, second most for a single season in Rams history (17th in NFL history), behind Kurt Warner's 375 in 2001. He had his first 4,000-yard passing season after throwing for 4,301 yards, the fourth-best season in franchise history (29th in NFL history). Bulger's 588 passing attempts were the most in Rams' history, while his 1.4 interception percentage was the best in team history (tied for 11th in NFL history).

Bulger finished second in the NFL in completions, second in the NFC (third in the NFL) in yards, tied for second in the NFC (tied for fourth in the NFL) in touchdowns, third in the NFL in attempts, third in the NFC (eighth in the NFL) in completion percentage, third in the NFC (fourth in the NFL) in interceptions, fourth in the NFC (ninth in the NFL) with a 7.31 average gain, fourth in the NFC (seventh in the NFL) in passer rating, sixth in the NFC (12th in the NFL) with a 91.5 fourth-quarter passer rating, and fourth in the NFC (seventh in the NFL) with an 88.1 third-down passer rating.

In Week 1 last year vs. Denver, Bulger completed his 1,000th career pass, making him the fastest quarterback in NFL history to reach that mark, doing it in just 45 games. In Week 13 vs. Arizona, Bulger eclipsed the 15,000-yard mark for his career. He did it in 56 games, tying Bulger with Warner and Hall of Famer Dan Marino as the fastest players to reach this milestone. Bulger has 16,233 career passing yards, third-most in franchise history, and second most in NFL history for a player's first 60 games.

## **BIG GAME T. HOLT**

After being drafted by the Rams with the sixth overall pick in the 1999 NFL Draft, WR Torry Holt quickly began to develop into one of the league's best receivers. Holt led all rookie wide receivers in receptions and receiving yards that year and set a Super Bowl rookie record for receptions (seven) and receiving yards (109) as the Rams defeated the Tennessee Titans in Super Bowl XXXIV.

Now in his ninth year in the NFL, the six-time Pro Bowl selection has totaled 712 receptions for 10,765 yards and 64 touchdowns in 126 regular season games and has 47 receptions for 630 yards and 4 touchdowns in postseason play. Holt ranks third in receptions and second in receiving yards in Rams' history.

In 2006, Holt started all 16 games for the Rams and led the team with 93 receptions (fourth in the NFL) for 1,188 yards (eighth in the NFL) and scored 10 touchdowns.

Over the course of his career, Holt has reached a number of milestones. Holt became the first player in NFL history to garner six consecutive 1,300-yard receiving seasons (2000-05) and reached 10,000 career receiving yards faster than any other player in NFL history and trails only Indianapolis Colts' WR Marvin Harrison as the second fastest player in league history to reach 700 receptions. His 85.7 receiving yards per game stands as an NFL all-time mark.

Since 2000, Holt's second season in the NFL, his 10,675 receiving yards lead the NFL, his 712 receptions rank second and his 43 100-yard receiving games are the second most behind New England Patriots' WR Randy Moss.

## **JACK IN THE BOX**

RB Steven Jackson has emerged as one of the best running backs in the NFL. Last season, he had a career-high 1,528 rushing yards on 346 carries (4.4-yard average) with 13 touchdowns. He added a career-high 90 receptions for 806 yards and three touchdowns. His rushing total was third in the NFC (fifth in the NFL), while his reception numbers led the NFL among running backs and was fourth in the NFC (tied for seventh in the NFL). His 2,334 yards from scrimmage led the NFL. Jackson's 105 first downs led the NFC (second in the NFL), and his 96 points tied for the NFC lead (tied for third in the NFL) in scoring among nonkickers.

Jackson's 90 receptions set a team record for a running back and rank sixth-most for a running back in NFL history. His 2,334 yards from scrimmage were the second-most in Rams' history and the fifth-best yardage season in NFL history. His 436 offensive "touches" were the second most in Rams' history and 11th in NFL history. Jackson's 1,528-yard rushing total was the fourth-best season in Rams' history and the best since Hall of Famer Eric Dickerson's 1,821-yard season in 1986.

#### **OFFENSE**

##### **QUARTERBACKS (2) – Doug Nussmeier**

Marc Bulger (7), Gus Frerotte (14)

**Marc Bulger** returns under center after a solid 2006 season which saw him selected to his second Pro Bowl in three years. Bulger's 588 attempts, 370 completions, 4,301 yards and 24 touchdowns were all career highs, helping the Rams signal caller post a passer rating of 92.9, good for seventh in the NFL. Bulger passed the 1,000 career completions plateau in Week One against Denver, completing 18 of 34 passes for 217 yards in the Rams' season opening victory. A 314-yard performance in Week 13 against Arizona helped Bulger surpass 15,000 career passing yards. Reaching the milestone in just 54 career games, Bulger tied Hall of Famer Dan Marino and former Ram Kurt Warner as the fastest quarterbacks to reach 15,000 career passing yards in league history. **Gus Frerotte** is back for his second year as Bulger's backup after posting a quarterback rating of 101.0 during the 2007 preseason. Frerotte's only action of 2006 came on the final drive of the first half against San Francisco in Week 12, during which he completed one of three passes for 27 yards before the half ended on a successful Jeff Wilkins field goal attempt.

##### **RUNNING BACKS (5) – Wayne Moses**

Madison Hedgecock (3), Steven Jackson (4), Brian Leonard (R), Travis Minor (7), Antonio Pittman (R)

After a Pro Bowl season and perhaps the biggest breakout performance in the NFL in 2006, **Steven Jackson** returns as the Rams feature back. Jackson set career highs in virtually every category last season, carrying the ball 346 times for 1,528 yards and 13 touchdowns, while also adding 90 receptions out of the backfield for 806 yards and three touchdowns. In an overtime win against Washington in Week 16, he became the first Ram to

record 100 yards rushing and receiving in a single game, carrying the ball 33 times for 150 yards and catching six passes for 102 yards. Jackson, who was named the NFC Offensive Player of The Month for December, finished at or near the top of the NFL in a variety of statistical categories, including rushing yards (fifth), yards from scrimmage (first), receptions (seventh), first downs (second) and points scored (tied for third). Rams 2007 second-round draft pick **Brian Leonard** was touted as one of the most versatile backs in college football last season, showing the ability to run, catch and block out of the backfield. The former All-America honoree left Rutgers holding school records for career receptions (207), touchdowns (45) and points scored (272). New addition **Travis Minor** provides added depth and valuable contributions on special teams after spending the previous six seasons in Miami, where he rushed for 1,133 yards on 277 carries. Rounding out the Rams quartet of tailbacks is Saints 2007 fourth-round draft pick **Antonio Pittman**, who joins the Rams after being released by New Orleans following the 2007 preseason. Pittman opted to enter the draft early after leading Ohio State in rushing as both a sophomore and junior, helping Ohio State to a 23-3 overall record during his time as a starter. Fullback **Madison Hedgecock** has played in all 16 games the past two seasons and will look to contribute both as a blocking back and on special teams.

##### **WIDE RECEIVERS (6) – Henry Ellard**

Drew Bennett (7), Isaac Bruce (14), Marques Hagans (1), Dante Hall (8), Torry Holt (9), Dane Looker (7)

One of the most consistent wide receivers in NFL history, **Torry Holt** returns for his ninth season with the Rams. En route to being selected to his fourth straight Pro Bowl and fifth overall, Holt caught 93 balls for 1,188 yards and 10 touchdowns during the 2006 season. In Week Four against Detroit, Holt moved past receivers coach Henry Ellard for second place on the Rams all-time receiving yards list, while also passing Ellard and moving into third place on the Rams all-time yards from scrimmage list. Holt's three-touchdown performance against Seattle on

10/15 pushed him past Hall of Famer Eric Dickerson and into ninth place on the Rams all-time scoring list. Also against Seattle, Holt's 154 receiving yards made him the fastest player in NFL history to eclipse the 10,000 yard mark, reaching the milestone after just 116 games. The last remaining player from the Los Angeles Rams, **Isaac Bruce** is still a solid contributor heading into his 14th season with the franchise. Bruce caught 74 passes for 1,098 yards and three touchdowns in 2006, moving him into eighth place on the NFL's all-time receptions list and seventh place on the all-time receiving yardage list. His seven catch, 66-yard performance against Seattle on 11/12 pushed Bruce's career total over 13,000 receiving yards, making him the ninth player to reach that mark. After spending the past six seasons with the Tennessee Titans, **Drew Bennett** joins the Rams after signing as a free agent in the offseason. After originally starting his career at UCLA as a quarterback, Bennett developed in a reliable receiver and, at 6'5", is a big target for QB Marc Bulger. Bennett totaled up more than 4,000 receiving yards to go along with 25 touchdowns during his Titans career and is coming off a solid season in 2006 which saw him catch 46 passes for 737 yards and three touchdowns. Joining Bennett as a new addition to the Rams receiving corps is former Kansas City Chief **Dante Hall**. One of the most dynamic return men in NFL history, Hall is also a more than capable receiver, steadily producing in the 30 catch range throughout his career. In 2006, Hall caught 26 passes for 204 yards and two touchdowns. He enters the season with 11 return touchdowns, good for third in NFL history. **Dane Looker** enters his fifth year with the Rams looking to lock down his spot as the fifth receiver, while also contributing on special teams both on coverage units and as the holder. Second-year receiver **Marques Hagans** moves to the 53-man roster in 2007 after spending the 2006 campaign as a member of the practice squad. Hagans, selected by the Rams in the fifth round of the 2006 NFL Draft, posted solid numbers during the preseason with 13 receptions for 166 yards and an NFL-leading three receiving touchdowns, while also returning both kick-offs and punts on special teams.

#### **TIGHT ENDS (4) – Judd Garrett**

Dominique Byrd (2), Joe Klopfenstein (2), Randy McMichael (6), Aaron Walker (5)

Newly acquired tight end **Randy McMichael** comes to the Rams after five productive years with the Miami Dolphins, one of which was spent under the tutelage of then Dolphins offensive coordinator Scott Linehan. In 2006, McMichael caught 62 passes for 640 yards and three touchdowns. A pair of second-year tight ends, **Joe Klopfenstein** and **Dominique Byrd**, return to provide depth at the tight end position. Klopfenstein started all 16 games, catching 20 balls for 226 yards and one touchdown. Byrd was inactive for much of the year and finished his rookie season with two catches for 39 yards and a touchdown in five games played. At 6'6", 270, **Aaron Walker** has excellent size and proved to be a valuable blocking tight end, playing in all 16 games and starting five in 2006.

#### **OFFENSIVE LINE (9) – Paul Boudreau, Jim Chaney**

Alex Barron (3), Milford Brown (6), Adam Goldberg (5), Richie Incognito (3), Andy McCollum (14), Orlando Pace (11), Brett Romberg (4), Mark Setterstrom (2), Claude Terrell (3)

After missing the final seven games of 2006, **Orlando Pace**, the Rams leader on the offensive line, returns at full strength. A former number one overall pick, Pace's streak of seven consecutive Pro Bowls was snapped last year after his season was derailed by a torn triceps. Also returning are **Richie Incognito** and **Alex Barron**, a pair of third-year players who both started all 16 games last season. While Barron remained at his regular position at right tackle, Incognito displayed his versatility by playing both guard positions as well as center. Following a strong 2006 season which saw him start the final three games of the season, **Brett Romberg** will pick up where he left off, becoming a full time starter for the first time in his career. Another interior lineman who figures to be in the mix for significant playing time is second-year man **Mark Setterstrom**, who came on strong at the end of last year to start the final six games at left guard. After a knee injury in the first game of 2006 cost him the remainder of the season, veteran center **Andy McCollum** returns for his 14th NFL season. **Adam Goldberg** returns to the Rams for the 2007 campaign after providing valuable versatility as a backup lineman during the 2006 season. **Claude Terrell** and **Milford Brown** will provide added depth at the guard position, with Brown likely seeing some work at tackle, as well. **T Todd Steussie** was expected to provide depth, but will spend the 2007 season on the reserve/injured list after breaking his foot in the preseason finale vs. Kansas City.

#### **DEFENSE / SPECIAL TEAMS**

##### **DEFENSIVE LINE (9) – Brian Baker, Mike Cox**

Victor Adeyanju (2), Adam Carriker (R), La'Roi Glover (12), James Hall (8), Trevor Johnson (4), Leonard Little (10), Eric Moore (3), Clifton Ryan (R), Claude Wroten (2)

**DE Leonard Little** returns after leading the team in 2006 with 13.5 sacks, and leading the defensive line in tackles with 71 (60 solo). Little also added 33 quarterback pressures, one pass defensed and tied for the team lead with six forced fumbles. **DT La'Roi Glover** will return to add leadership to the defensive line after tallying 52 tackles (34 solo) in 2006. He finished second on the team with 5.5 sacks and had one pass defensed, 13 quarterback pressures, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. **DE James Hall**, who was acquired in an offseason trade will start at defensive end opposite of Little and will be key in the Rams' pass defense. Hall tallied 5.0 sacks in seven games for Detroit last season before being placed on reserved/injured due to a shoulder injury. 2007 first-round draft pick **DT Adam Carriker** will start at defensive tackle along with Glover. Carriker was one of the Big 12 Conference's most dominant defensive players while at Nebraska and saw significant action in his first NFL preseason. **DE Victor Adeyanju** had a promising rookie season in 2006, starting nine games and finishing with 42 tackles (30 solo), 1.0 sack, one quarterback pressure and two fumble recoveries. His fumble recovery at Seattle, returned 89 yards for a touchdown,

marked the fifth longest fumble recovery return in Rams history. **DT Claude Wroten** saw action in his rookie campaign, notching 15 tackles (nine solo), 1.0 sack, seven quarterback pressures and one forced fumble. Rookie **DT Clifton Ryan**, a fifth-round choice from Michigan State, will see action as a backup. **DE Eric Moore** was picked up by the Rams in November last season and he saw action in three games. Four-year veteran **DE Trevor Johnson** joins the Rams after splitting time between the New York Jets and New Orleans last season.

#### **LINEBACKERS (7) – Rick Venturi**

Brandon Chillar (4), Quinton Culberson (R), Chris Draft (9), Tim McGarigle (1), Raonall Smith (6), Pisa Tinoisamoa (5), Will Witherspoon (6)

**Will Witherspoon** led the team in tackles in his first year with the Rams last season, totaling 136 tackles (104 solo), 3.0 sacks, one interception, six passes defended, nine quarterback pressures, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. In six games last season, Witherspoon had double-digit tackles. **Brandon Chillar** had his best season as a Ram in 2006, finishing fourth on the team with a career-high 77 tackles (54 solo), 2.0 sacks, one pass defended, and five quarterback pressures. He led the team with a career-high 10 tackles in Week 12 vs. San Francisco. **Pisa Tinoisamoa** is healthy entering the 2007 season. Last season, Tinoisamoa finished with 47 tackles (27 solo) 2.0 sacks one pass defended and one fumble recovery in 11 games before being placed on the reserve/injured list due to a shoulder injury. **Raonall Smith** saw action in all 16 games in 2006, his first season as a Ram. He made eight tackles (four solo), 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery, and led the team with 13 special teams tackles. The Rams acquired free agent **Chris Draft** in the offseason, and the nine-year veteran from Stanford, will be an important backup and special teams player. Draft posted 111 tackles and a career-high 5.5 sacks last season as Carolina's starting middle linebacker. 2006 seventh-round draft choice **Tim McGarigle** spent last season on the Rams' practice squad, but has found a home on the team's active roster this season despite being slowed by a hamstring injury in the pre-season. Undrafted rookie free agent **Quinton Culberson** from Mississippi State rounds out the linebacking corps after a strong preseason that saw him finish third on the team in tackles.

#### **SECONDARY (8) – Willy Robinson, Ron Milus**

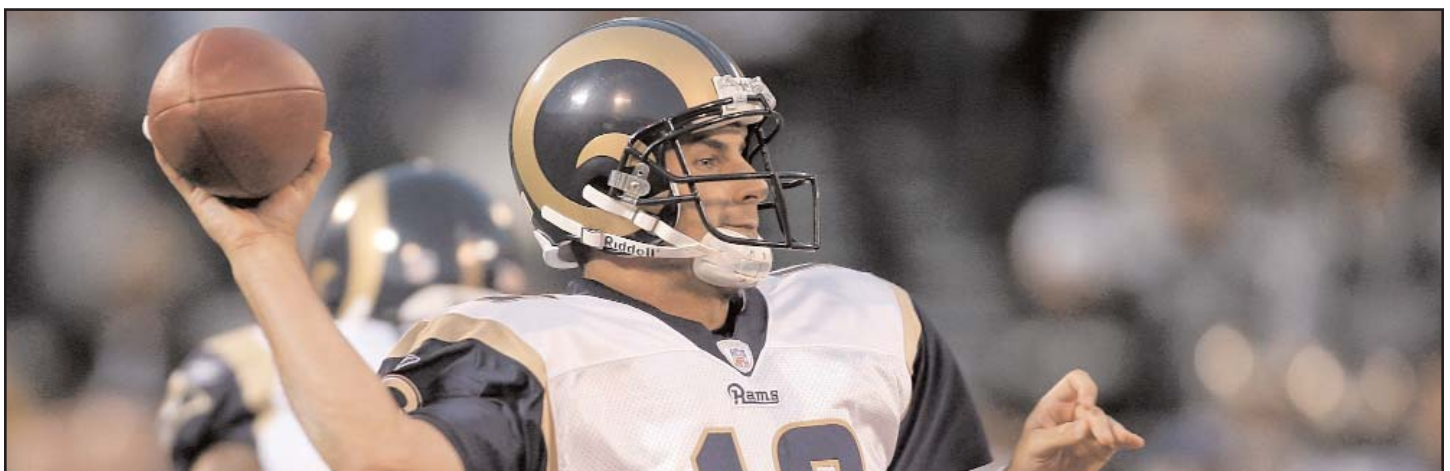

**S Corey Chavous** finished second on the team in 2006 with 118 tackles (82 solo) 1.0 sack, one interception, six passes defended, nine quarterback pressures, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. **S Oshiomogho Atogwe** had a career year in 2006 when he finished third on the team with 91 tackles (62 solo), posted 1.0 sack, tied for a team-high three interceptions, had five passes defended, nine quarterback pressures, and tied for a team-high six forced fumbles with one fumble recovery. **CB Ron Bartell** had a breakout year last season and looks forward to continuing that success. Bartell made a career-high three interceptions in 2006 while playing in all 16 games. Bartell will serve as one of the Rams' starting CBs while CB Fakhir Brown serves a four-game suspension. Brown had a strong 2006 season, finished fifth on the team with 76 tackles (64 solo), 1.0 sack, tied for a team-high with three interceptions, nine passes defended and two forced fumbles in his first season with the Rams. **CB Tye Hill** enters his sophomore season as a starting CB, after tying for team lead with three interceptions in 2006, the most interceptions by a rookie since Pisa Tinoisamoa had three in 2003. **S Jerome Carter** saw action in 14 games in 2006 and tallied 20 tackles (14 solo), two interceptions, one pass defended and three quarterback pressures. The Rams anticipate added help in the secondary from **CB Lenny Walls** and **S Todd Johnson**, both acquired as free agents in the offseason. 2007 third-round pick **CB Jonathan Wade** out of Tennessee will contribute as a backup in the secondary this season. Wade earned *Associated Press All-Southeastern Conference* honors.

#### **SPECIAL TEAMS (3) – Al Roberts, Todd Downing**

Donnie Jones (4), Chris Massey (6), Jeff Wilkins (14)

**K Jeff Wilkins** plans to continue where he left off in 2006, where he finished second in the NFC (third in the NFL) in scoring (131 points – 35/35 PATs, 32/37 FGs). **LS Chris Massey**, one of the most consistent players at his position, continues long snapping duties, while **P Donnie Jones** enters his first season with the Rams after spending 2006 in Miami.
