RAMS HOST SEATTLE AIMING FOR THIRD CONSECUTIVE VICTORY

500 WINS!

It was Sept. 21, 1937 when Head Coach Hugo Bezdek and the Cleveland Rams earned the franchise's first win, a 21-3 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles at the Philadelphia Municipal Stadium. Seventy years later, the Rams have become only the sixth team in the National Football League to eclipse the 500-victory mark with a 13-9 victory over the San Francisco 49ers last week. The Rams join the Chicago Bears, Green Bay Packers, New York Giants, Washington Redskins and Pittsburgh Steelers in the 500-win club.

The 500th victory came against one of the Rams most familiar foes, having played San Francisco 117 times, more than any other team in the NFL. The victory marked the Rams' 60th regular season win over the 49ers, the most victories the Rams have had over any team in the league.

Since 1937, the Rams have had 40 winning seasons, including winning three world championships, three NFC Championships, five NFL Western Conference Championships, two NFL Coastal Division championships, 11 NFC West Championships, and making 27 playoff appearances, second most appearances in the NFL.

Win No. 100 – Dec. 12, 1954, Rams vs. Green Bay Packers

In front of nearly 38,000 fans, the Los Angeles Rams defeated the Green Bay Packers 35-27 in the final game of the 1954 season. QBs Norm Van Brocklin and Bill Wade combined to complete 23 of 36 passes for 434 yards and two touchdowns, while split end Bob Boyd led the receivers with four catches for 106 yards. RB Dan Towler rushed 14 times for 48 yards and three touchdowns.

Win No. 200 – Dec. 12, 1970, Rams at New York Giants

In another season finale, the Rams beat the New York

Giants 31-3, at Yankee Stadium. RB Les Josephson led all rushers with 106 yards on 20 carries and one touchdown. QB Roman Gabriel completed 13 of 21 passes for 158 yards and two touchdowns, and WR Pat Studstill caught six passes for 77 yards and two touchdowns. Doubling as the team's punter, Studstill also punted six times for a 39.3-yard average.

Win No. 300 – Dec. 21, 1980, Rams vs. Atlanta Falcons

In the last game of the season, the Rams outlasted the Atlanta Falcons 20-17 in overtime. With less than a minute to play in regulation, QB Vice Ferragamo completed three of six passes for 39 yards to set up a 47-yard K Frank Corral FG that was blocked. In overtime Falcons QB Steve Bartkowski was sacked by LB Joe Harris, forcing a fumble. The Rams recovered the ball on the Falcons' 6-yard line, where Corral hit a 23-yard field goal to win the game.

Win No. 400 – Sept. 10 1995, Rams vs. New Orleans Saints

In the Rams inaugural season home opener in St. Louis, the Ram topped the New Orleans Saints 17-13. RB Jerome Bettis led all rushers with 83 yards on 20 carries, and WR Isaac Bruce scored the Rams only offensive touchdown of the game, a 33-yard touchdown pass from QB Chris Miller.

THE ANATOMY OF A RIVALRY

The Rams return to the Edward Jones Dome this week to host NFC West rival Seattle Seahawks for the second of two meetings this season. Seattle won the first matchup this season, defeating the Rams, 33-6, at Qwest Field in Week 7.

The Rams lead the all-time series against the Seahawks 10-9, dating to a 45-6 victory in Seattle's inaugural season in 1976. Since the Seahawks joined the NFC West due to realignment in 2002, the Seahawks hold a 7-4 advantage in the regular season, while the Rams have won the only postseason game between the teams, a 27-20 victory in the NFC Wildcard Playoff game in 2004.

Since Seattle joined the NFC West, the teams have had close games. In 12 meetings, seven have been decided by a touchdowns or less.

Sept. 21, 2003 – Seahawks Stadium Seattle 24, Rams 23

The Rams took a 23-10 lead into the fourth quarter. Seattle QB Matt Hasselbeck hit WR Darrell Jackson for a touchdown score, and with 1:03 left, connected with WR Koren Robinson on a 3-yard touchdown pass to give Seattle the victory.

Dec. 14, 2003 – Edward Jones Dome Rams 27, Seattle 22

Seattle cut the Rams lead to 24-22 on a 2-yard touchdown run by RB Shaun with 10 minutes left in the game. After a 10-play, 57-yard drive, K Jeff Wilkins hit a 46-yard field goal to give the Rams 27-22 lead with only 1:37 left in the game.

Oct. 10, 2004 – Qwest Field Rams 33, Seattle 27 (OT)

The Rams' 17-point fourth quarter comeback marked the second-largest comeback with less than six minutes left to

play in NFL history. In the fourth quarter, QB Marc Bulger connected with TE Brandon Manumaleuna and WR Kevin Curtis for touchdowns and Wilkins hit a 36-yard field goal to force the game into overtime. In overtime, Bulger hit WR Shaun McDonald for a 52-yard touchdown strike for the win.

Jan. 8, 2005 – Qwest Field Rams 27, Seattle 20 NFC Wildcard Game

With 5:42 to play, Bulger led a seven-play, 76-yard drive that was capped with a touchdown pass to TE Cam Cleeland to give the Rams a 27-20 lead. Hasselbeck led the Seahawks downfield, and on fourth-and-1 from the Rams' 5-yard line with 27 seconds left, Hasselbeck threw an incomplete pass to WR Bobby Engram in the endzone for the final margin.

Oct. 9, 2005 – Edward Jones Dome Seattle 37, Rams 31

The Rams cut Seattle's lead to 37-31 with less than four minutes to play. After forcing Seattle into fourth-and-11, Shaun McDonald fumbled the punt return and Seattle recovers to run out the clock.

Oct. 15, 2006 – Edward Jones Dome Seattle 30, Rams 28

With 1:44 to play, Bulger connected with Holt for a 67-yard touchdown reception to give the Rams a 28-27 lead. With four seconds left, Seattle's K Josh Brown hit a 54-yard field goal for the win.

Nov. 11, 2006 – Qwest Field Seattle 24, Rams 22

The Rams took a 22-21 lead on a 14-yard touchdown run by Steven Jackson with 2:37 left. Seattle marched down field and with 13 seconds left on the clock, Brown made a 38-yard field goal, giving the Seahawks a 24-22 victory.

THE LAST TIME

Qwest Field, October 21, 2007 (68,164) – The Rams went on the road for a Week 7 matchup with NFC West rival Seattle, falling 33-6. QB Marc Bulger returned to the lineup for the first time since Week 4. WR Torry Holt recorded 82 yard receiving on eight receptions, passing Michael Irvin and Charlie Joiner for 21st place on the NFL's all-time receptions list with 752. P Donnie Jones punted six times for a 52.3-yard average with a long of 80 yards, a career-high that was good for the third longest punt in team history, as well as the league-leading mark this season. LB Will Witherspoon made a career-high 16 tackles, including 15 solo stops. LB Pisa Tinoisamoa reached double figures in total tackles for the third consecutive game, making 12 stops on the day. CB Ron Bartell recorded his first interception of the season, picking off Seattle QB Matt Hasselbeck midway through the second quarter. WR Brandon Williams handled primary kick and punt return duties for the second straight week, picking up a career best 171 yards on seven kickoff returns. K Jeff Wilkins led the team in scoring for the sixth time this season, connecting on field goal attempts of 31 and 29 yards.

THE HEAD COACHES

SCOTT LINEHAN (2nd season as head coach, 2nd with Rams; Career Record: 10-16) – Named twenty-second head coach in franchise history by Owner/Chairman Georgia Frontiere on January 19, 2006. Linehan rallied the Rams to an 8-8 finish in his first season. Quarterback Marc Bulger enjoyed the best season of his career, including 4,301 yards passing and 24 touchdowns. Balancing the offensive attack, Linehan guided Steven Jackson to lead the league with 2,334 combined yards, and set a Rams running back record with 90 catches. Prior to joining the Rams, Linehan was the offensive coordinator of the Miami Dolphins; the Dolphins improved from 29th in 2004 to 14th in total offensive in 2005. Linehan spent three seasons (2002-2004) as offensive coordinator for the Minnesota Vikings. In 2004, Daunte Culpepper posted the fourth-highest single season passer rating in NFL history (110.9). A college quarterback, Linehan was a free agent signee with the Dallas Cowboys before a shoulder injury ended his active career.

MIKE HOLMGREN (16th season as head coach, 9th with Seattle; Career Record: 165-107) – Named as the Seahawks' sixth head coach on January 8, 1999. In 2006, the Seahawks won their third consecutive NFC West crown and fifth-ever division title. In 2005, led them to a franchise-best record 13-3 finish, and their first-ever Super Bowl berth. In 2003, the Seahawks posted their first double-digit victory total since 1986. Holmgren joined Seattle after serving as the head coach of the Packers (1992-98). By winning at least one game in five consecutive postseasons (1993-97) Holmgren joined John Madden (1973-77) as the only coaches in league history to accomplish that feat. In 21 NFL seasons (1999-2006 head coach Seattle, 1992-98 head coach Green Bay, 1986-91 assistant coach San Francisco) Holmgren's teams have a 218-116-1 (.652) record, posted double-digit win totals 12 times, made the postseason 16 times, won three Super Bowls (XXIII, XXIV, and XXXI), and reached two others (XXXII and XL).

LAST WEEK

Monster Park, November 18, 2007 (68,039) – The Rams traveled to Monster Park for a Week 11 matchup with NFC West rival San Francisco, defeating the 49ers 13-9 for their second consecutive victory. The win marked the 500th victory in franchise history, as the Rams became just the sixth team in NFL history to reach the milestone. WR Isaac Bruce recorded 54 yards receiving, passing Rams wide receiver coach Henry Ellard for sixth place on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list. WR Torry Holt caught seven passes for 55 yards, passing former Ram Marshall Faulk for 19th place on the NFL's all-time receptions list. K Jeff Wilkins recorded two field goals, moving into 18th place on both the NFL's all-time field goal and scoring lists. In his second game since returning from injury, RB Steven Jackson carried 23 times for 92 yards, adding four receptions for 20 yards. The Rams opened the scoring on the game's first drive when QB Marc Bulger found Holt for a 3-yard touchdown strike, capping a nine-play, 79-yard drive. 49ers K Joe Nedney and Wilkins added a field goal each before CB Tye Hill made his first interception of the season with under a minute left in the first half, keeping the score at 10-7 after two quarters. After Wilkins converted his second field goal attempted of the game, Nedney retaliated with his second and third successful field goal attempts to cut the lead to four. A late surge by the 49ers came up short as the Rams defense held onto the 13-9 lead, with S OJ Atogwe preserving the victory with an interception in the end zone with just three second remaining.

BULGER vs. HASSELBECK

In 2002, the St. Louis Rams and Seattle Seahawks become division foes in the newly re-aligned NFC West.

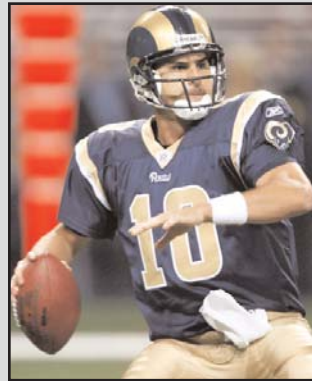
That same season, Marc Bulger started seven games for the Rams after injuries sidelined Kurt Warner, who began the year as the Rams starter at QB.

In Seattle, Matt Hasselbeck became the starter for the Seahawks, starting 10 games, after injuries sidelined opening day starter, Trent Dilfer.

Since that season in 2002, Bulger and Hasselbeck have gone on to become the long-term starters in the NFL, and have proven to be two of the best QBs in the league.

Since 2002, Hasselbeck (18,837) and Bulger (17,990) rank fifth and seventh, respectively, in passing yards. Bulger's 64.0 completion percentage ranks sixth in the NFL since 2002 and Hasselbeck's 61.5 completion percentage ranks 18th. Hasselbeck's 122 touchdowns since 2002, rank fourth and Bulger's 101 touchdowns ranks 8th. Bulger's 89.4 passer rating is 8th in the NFL since 2002 and Hasselbeck's 87.8 passer rating stands 11th.

TYE-ING UP THE OPPOSITION

CB Tye Hill had a solid performance in Week 11 against the San Francisco 49ers. He registered three solo tackles and a career-high three pass defenses. Hill has already doubled his four pass defenses of last season in six games this year. Hill collected his first interception of the season at the end of the first half, killing the 49ers drive.

In Week 10 at New Orleans, Hill tallied four solo tackles and two passes defended matching his four tackle (three solo) performance in Week 7 at Seattle. Before being inactive for four games with a back injury, Hill set a career best for a single game with six solo tackles and one pass defense in the season opener against the Carolina Panthers.

On the season, Hill has 21 tackles (18 solo), one interception and eight pass defenses.

GETS BETTER WITH TIME

WR Isaac Bruce is in his 14th year in the NFL, and continues to put up receiving numbers that rank among the best that have played the game. In Week 10 at San Francisco, Bruce caught a 15-yard pass in the first drive of the game that catapulted him pass wide receivers coach Henry Ellard (13,777) for sixth place on the NFL's all-time list in receiving yards. Bruce finished the game second on the team with five receptions for 54 yards, giving him 13,817 career receiving yards. Of those receiving yards, 1,925 yards had come against the 49ers.

Bruce also passed Cris Carter (13,940) for 20th place on the NFL's all-time scrimmage yards list, totaling 13,967 for his career.

In Week 9 at New Orleans, Bruce made four receptions for 62 yards and one touchdown, his first of the season. Bruce caught a 9-yard pass from QB Marc Bulger in the third quarter to give the Rams a 27-7 lead. With one more touchdown reception, Bruce will pass Art Powell for 17th place on the NFL's all-time touchdown receptions list.

In Week 3 at Tampa Bay, Bruce eclipsed the 900-reception mark in 186 games, making him the third fastest player to reach the milestone behind Marvin Harrison (149) and Jerry Rice (168).

In Week 2 this season, Bruce led the team with eight catches for a season-high 145 yards against San Francisco.

Bruce is also the Rams all-time leader in receptions (919), receiving yards (13,817) and receiving touchdowns (81). Bruce is one of 18 players to lead their team in all three major receiving categories.

X-FACTOR

WR Dante Hall continues to show why he is one of the best return men in NFL history. After missing the past four contests with an ankle injury, Hall returned in Week 11 and made his presence felt against the San Francisco 49ers not only in the return game but on the offensive side of the ball as well.

On the Rams opening possession, Hall carried the ball for a 9-yard gain and later made a key block, springing RB Steven Jackson for a 37-yard gain that led to the Rams first score of the game and a 7-0 lead. Hall would again come up big, this time with 14:15 left in the fourth quarter, setting up what became the game-winning drive with a 29-yard punt return to the 49ers 33-yard line.

In Week 4 against Dallas, Hall continued to ascend the NFL charts after making his first punt return for a touchdown of the season. The 85-yard return marked Hall's sixth-career punt return for a touchdown, most among active players. It also marked his 12th-career touchdown return, tied for second most in NFL history. With one more return for a touchdown, Hall will be tied with Brian Mitchell for most kick return touchdowns all time. Mitchell played 14 years. Hall is in his eighth season.

Hall ranks third in the NFL in punt return average (13.8) and his 85-yard return is the fifth longest punt return in the NFL this season.

BIG GAME T. HOLT

The last time the Rams faced Seattle at home, WR Torry Holt had one of the biggest receiving games of his career. Holt caught eight passes for 154 yards and three touchdowns, averaging 19.3-yards per catch. Earlier this season in Week 6 at Seattle, Holt led the team in receptions and receiving yards, catching eight passes for 82 yards, with all eight receptions coming in the second half. His performance vaulted him past Hall of Famers Charlie Joiner and Michael Irvin to move into 21st place on the NFL's all-time receptions list, catching 56 passes for 770 yards and four touchdowns, averaging 77.0 yards per game and 13.8 yards per catch.

Entering Week 12, Holt is tied for third in the NFC (tied for eighth in the NFL) with 61 receptions. He ranks third in the NFC (ninth in the NFL) with 755 receiving yards, and is second in the NFC (tied for fifth in the NFL) with 18 third-down receptions. Holt is tied for 10th in the NFL with 39 first downs.

Last week at San Francisco, Holt led the team for the eighth time this season, catching seven passes for 55 yards and one touchdown. Holt caught a 3-yard touchdown pass from QB Marc Bulger to give the Rams a 7-0 lead in the first quarter. The touchdown marked the fifth of the season for Holt, 69th of his career. On Holt's third reception of the game, an 8-yarder from QB Marc Bulger, he passed Rod Smith (11,389) for 18th place on the NFL's all-time list for receiving yards. Holt finished the game with 11,430 career receiving yards.

Also, Holt's seven receptions pushed him past former teammate Marshall Faulk (767) on the NFL's all-time receptions list. Holt now has 773 career receptions.

In Week 9 at New Orleans, Holt led the team tying a season-high with eight catches for a season-high 124 yards. The game marked his second 100-yard receiving game of the season, 45th of his career. Holt's 45 100-yard receiving games are third most since 1999.

On a 9-yard reception in the third quarter, Holt passed Hall of Famer James Lofton (764) on the NFL's all-time reception list.

In Week 8 against Cleveland, Holt led the team with 110 receiving yards on six receptions, his first 100-yard receiving performance this season, 44th of his career.

Against Arizona in Week 5, Holt passed the 11,000-career receiving yards mark. Holt reached the 11,000-yard mark in 131 games, fastest of any player in league history.

Holt leads the team in receptions this season, and has done so since 2002. He also leads the team in receiving yards, and has led the team in that category since 2000. In 2003, Holt made a career-high 117 catches for a career-high 1,696 yards and 12 touchdowns. His 117 receptions rank second-most in team history and seventh

most in NFL history.

Since 2000, Holt has 10,642 receiving yards, more than any other player in the NFL. From 2000-2005, he had at least 1,300 receiving yards in each season, the first player in league history to record six consecutive 1,300-yard receiving seasons. His 721 receptions since 2000, is second-most in the NFL.

Holt has the highest career receiving yards per game average in NFL history with 11,430 in 136 games (84.0 avg.).

LB Will Witherspoon leads the team in tackles and sacks this season. After nine games, Witherspoon has 91 tackles (72 solo), 4.0 sacks, seven passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Witherspoon's 4.0 sacks are the most he has had in one season in his career.

Last week at San Francisco, Witherspoon made eight tackles (six solo), his third consecutive game with 1.0 sack, and a season-high three passes defended.

Witherspoon sacked QB Trent Dilfer in the second quarter for an 8-yard loss, helping force the 49ers to punt.

For the fourth time this season, LB Will Witherspoon led the team in tackles in Week 10 at New Orleans, collecting seven tackles (six solo), 1.0 sack and one forced fumble. Witherspoon sacked QB Drew Brees in the first quarter for a 7-yard loss causing him to fumble.

Against Cleveland in Week 8, Witherspoon had his second consecutive double-digit tackle game, fourth of the season, after leading the team with 10 solo tackles and 1.0 sack. The 10 solo tackles was the fourth-highest solo tackle output of his career.

In Week 7 at Seattle, Witherspoon had a career day, collecting a career-best 16 tackles (15 solo) and one pass defended. The tackle total was the highest for Witherspoon since he made 13 tackles at San Diego (10/29/06). The 15 solo tackles also marked a career best, eclipsing his 13 solo tackle mark that Witherspoon set at San Francisco (9/17/06).

The last time Witherspoon faced San Francisco in Week 2, he led the team with 11 tackles (nine solo).

In the season opener, Witherspoon led the linebackers with eight tackles (five solo), one pass defended and one fumble recovery.

A PUNTING JONES

P Donnie Jones is having a Pro-Bowl caliber year, as he is third in the NFL with a 48.9-yard punting average, and is fourth in the NFL (second in the NFC) with a 39.7-yard net average.

Last week at San Francisco, Jones punted a season-high nine times for a 44.3 average, with two kicks inside the 20-yard line and a long of 63 yards. The 63-yard punt marks his third-longest punt of the season. The nine punts is the second most in his career, behind his 10 punts vs. New York Jets last season (12/25/06).

In Week 7 at Seattle, Jones punted six times for a 52.3-yard average with a career long of 80 yards. The 80-yard punt marked the third longest punt in Rams history, and the longest in the NFL this season. The punt surpassed his then career long in of 66 yards that he set in Week 4 at Dallas.

Against Arizona in Week 5, Jones made four punts for a 56.0 average with a long of 60 yards. His 56.0-yard gross average was the best single game average in franchise history, passing Jack Jacobs' 55.8-average at Detroit Sept. 27, 1942.

A week earlier at Dallas, he punted eight times for a then career-high 55.3-yard average with a long of 66 yards, two touchbacks and four kicks inside the 20-yard line.

SACK ARTIST

Last week at San Francisco, DT La'Roi Glover made a season-high eight tackles including his second sack of the season and the 79th of his career, taking down 49ers' QB Trent Dilfer. Glover made his first sack of the season at Seattle in Week 7, bringing down Seahawks' QB Matt Hasselbeck.

Glover, a six-time Pro Bowl selection, has 79 career sacks and is tied for 8th among the NFL's career active sack leaders. Glover's best season came in 2000 as a member of the New Orleans Saints. That season, Glover posted 17.0 sacks, the second-highest total in NFL history for a defensive tackle behind Minnesota's Keith Millard's 18-sack effort in 1989.

The Rams roster also boasts another player in the top 10 among the NFL's active sack leaders. DE Leonard Little ranks 10th among the NFL's active sack leaders, but Little was placed on the reserve/injured list Nov. 7 with a toe injury. The Rams are the only team with two players in the top 10.

ACTION JACKSON

RB Steven Jackson led the team in rushing with 92 yards on 23 carries last week at San Francisco. The 23 carries as well as the 92 yards are both his second highest of the season.

Returning from injury, RB Steven Jackson gave a spark to the Rams offense – rushing as well as passing – at New Orleans in Week 10. Jackson led the team with 76 yards on 22 carries with one touchdown. Jackson also was second on the team with five receptions for 24 yards. Jackson scored on a 1-yard touchdown run in the first quarter to tie the score, 7-7. The score was the second on the season for Jackson.

Jackson also threw his first touchdown pass of his career. In the second quarter on the New Orleans 2-yard line, Jackson faked a run a hit TE Randy McMichael for a touchdown to give the Rams a 14-7 lead.

In Week 8 against Cleveland, Jackson rushed eight times for 41 yards and a touchdown in the first quarter before having to leave the game with back spasms and did not return. The game was Jackson's first since missing four games with a groin injury.

In Week 3 at Tampa Bay, Jackson rushed a season-high 30 times for a season-high 115 yards, his 11th 100-yard rushing performance of his career, first of the season.

In Week 2 against San Francisco, Jackson rushed 21 times for 60 yards and in the season opener against Carolina, he made 18 carries for 58 yards.

Although Jackson has played in only six games, he leads the team with 442 rushing yards on 122 carries and two touchdowns.

PISA MIND

LB Pisa Tinoisamoa remains one of the top tacklers on the Rams defense. In playing only eight games this season, Tinoisamoa is second on the team with 75 tackles (41 solo), two interceptions and two passes defensed.

In Week 11 at San Francisco, Tinoisamoa made eight tackles (five solo), finishing tied for third on the team.

In Week 10 at New Orleans, Tinoisamoa finished second on the team with six tackles (three solo) and one interception. He picked off QB Drew Brees in the second quarter and returned the pick 15 yards to the New Orleans 36-yard line. The pick was Tinoisamoa's second of the season, seventh of his career.

This season, Tinoisamoa has posted three consecutive double-digit tackle games. He finished second on the team with 12 tackles (five solo) in Week 7 at Seattle. In Week 6 at Baltimore, he made a team-high 15 tackles (eight solo) and one interception. In Week 5, Tinoisamoa led the defense with 15 tackles (nine solo) against Arizona. His 42-tackle total during that three-game span marks the most since LB London Fletcher collected 46 tackles over the same span in 2001 (12 vs. Carolina 11/11, 17 @ New England 11/18, 17 vs. Tampa Bay 11/26).

ON THE MARC

After earning NFC Player of the Week honors in Week 10 at New Orleans, Bulger returned to complete 21 of 32 passes for 155 yards and one touchdown, with a 87.4 passer rating at San Francisco last week. Bulger connected with WR Torry Holt for a 3-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter to give the Rams a 7-0 lead. Bulger and Holt have connected for 42 career touchdowns, tied for second most among active quarterback-wide receiver combos. For the second week in a row, Bulger has completed passes to at least seven receivers.

At New Orleans in Week 10, Bulger completed a season-high 27 of 33 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns. His 125.0 passer rating was fourth-highest of his career, and the highest since he had a 134.5 passer rating against Washington last season (12/24). His 81.1 completion percentage was the best percentage of his career, surpassing his previous high of 77.5 completion percentage at Atlanta (9/19/04). Bulger completed passes to seven receivers, with five receivers catching at least four passes.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Bulger connected with WR Drew Bennett on a 3-yard touchdown strike, spreading the Rams lead to 34-7, marking Bulger's first multi-touchdown game of the season. The touchdown also marked Bulger's 100th career touchdown pass.

In Week 8 vs. Cleveland, Bulger recorded his 25th career 300-yard passing game, only his second after missing two games due to injury. Bulger connected on 24 of 36 passes for 310 yards, the third-most passing yards in Week 8.

In Week 2 vs. San Francisco, Bulger had his first 300-yard passing game of the season, completing 24 of 41 passes for a season-high 368 yards and one touchdown.

RUN DOWN

After allowing 10 100-yard rushing performances in 2006, the Rams defense has not allowed a running back to rush for 100 yards this season. The Rams are only one of three teams (Dallas, Baltimore) who have not allowed a 100-yard rusher this season. The 10-game stretch marks the longest stretch the Rams have not allowed a player to rush for 100 yards in a game since the end of 2000 into the 2002 season, where the Rams went 21 straight games without allowing a 100-yard rusher.

This is how running backs have fared against the Rams this season:

Ss Corey Chavous and Oshiomogho Atogwe third and fourth on the team, respectively. Chavous has 64 tackles (40 solo) 2.0 sacks, two passes defensed and one forced fumble. Chavous has missed two games due to injury.

Atogwe has 63 tackles (46 solo), leads the team with three interceptions, three passes defensed, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Chavous led the team for the third time this season with 10 tackles (nine solo) and 1.0 sack at San Francisco last week. Chavous sacked QB Trent Dilfer in the fourth quarter for a 4-yard loss. The sack marked his second of the season, fourth of his career. His 2.0 sacks this season are the most he has had in one season in his career.

Chavous finished second on the team with nine tackles (five solo) against Cleveland in Week 8, his second-highest tackle total of the season.

At Seattle in Week 7, Chavous saw his first action after missing two games with an injury. He tied for a team-high among defensive backs with five tackles (three solo) and one pass defensed.

Prior to his injury, Chavous had notched back-to-back double digit tackle games, the first time since 2004. He made 10 tackles (six solo) at Dallas in Week 4, and added 1.0 sack, his first of the season, third of his career. In Week 3, he made 10 tackles (six solo) at Tampa Bay.

Last week at San Francisco, Atogwe finished second on the team with nine tackles (seven solo) and one interception. Atogwe intercepted QB Trent Dilfer on the final play of the game to seal the victory for the Rams. The pick marked his third of the season, seventh of his career, and his nine tackles are the second most for Atogwe this season.

At New Orleans in Week 10, Atogwe led the defensive backs with five tackles (four solo) and one interception. Atogwe intercepted QB Drew Brees and returned it 2 yards in the first quarter to give Rams possession on their 38-yard line.

Against Cleveland in Week 8, he made seven tackles (four solo), his third highest tackle total of the season, with one pass defensed.

Atogwe tied for a team-high among defensive backs with five tackles (three solo) and one pass defensed at Seattle in Week 7.

In 2006, Atogwe tied for the team high with six forced fumbles, developing a knack for causing turnovers. In Week 4 at Dallas, Atogwe made eight tackles (five solo), and one interception, his first of the season, fifth of his career. In Week 3 at Tampa Bay, he made six tackles (five solo) one forced fumble and one fumble recovery, earning Rams' Defensive Player of the Game honors.

In the season opener, Atogwe made 10 tackles (nine solo), his first double-digit tackle game of his career.

FOR THE LONGEST TIME

Since the Super Bowl era only five wide receiver tandems have been together for nine or more seasons. Rams' WRs Isaac Bruce and Torry Holt (1999-present) represent one pair, joining Pittsburgh's Lynn Swann and John Stallworth (1974-82), Miami's Mark Clayton and Mark Duper (1983-92), San Francisco's Jerry Rice and John Taylor (1987-95) and Denver's Rod Smith and Ed McCaffery (1995-2003).

The tandem of Bruce and Holt has proven to be one of the most effective long-term wide receiver pairs in NFL history, as Bruce and Holt have more receptions (1,380) and receiving yards (20,584) than any of the other four pairings.

Due to injuries, the Rams' offensive line has undergone shuffling throughout the 2007 season. Starting LT Orlando Pace, starting LG Mark Setterstrom and starting RG Richie Incognito are out for the season. RT Adam Goldberg who started for the Rams at Tampa Bay and in Week 4 at Dallas 9/30, suffered a knee injury versus the Cowboys and is also out for the season. Pace suffered a shoulder injury in Week 1 vs. Carolina 9/9 and Setterstrom injured his knee during the Rams' Week 3 matchup at Tampa Bay 9/23.

The Rams used their 15th different offensive line combination of the season in Week 10 at New Orleans. Injuries, however, were not the direct cause of the change. The team was expected to use the same offensive line that finished the game vs. Cleveland in Week 8 when they faced the Saints, but Brandon Gorin and Rob Pettiti shared time at RT. Gorin started the game, but after the first series Gorin began to alternate offensive series with Pettiti, who joined the team two weeks ago. The Rams used the same tactic last week at San Francisco, alternating Gorin and Pettiti throughout the game.

The Rams have used seven different starting offensive line combinations this season. The Rams have played only two games in which the same offensive line that began the game also finished the contest, a Week 5 matchup vs. Arizona 10/30 and last week's victory at San Francisco.

K Jeff Wilkins has proven to be one of the best kickers in the NFL.

In Week 10 at New Orleans, Wilkins converted all three of his field goal attempts and all four of his PAT attempts. The 13 points allowed Wilkins to pass Jim Bakken for 19th all-time on the NFL's all-time points list.

Wilkins' three field goals gave him 300 for his career and pushed him into a tie with Matt Bahr and Mark Moseley for 18th place all-time for career field goals made.

In Week 11 at San Francisco, Wilkins continued to climb the NFL charts. Wilkins converted two-of-two field goal attempts and added one PAT for seven total points. The seven points gave Wilkins 1,388 career points and allowed him to move past Moseley for 18th on the NFL's all-time points list. The 1,388 points rank seventh among active kickers.

Wilkins lone field goal at San Francisco broke the tie with Bahr and Moseley for 18th all-time on the NFL's career field goals made list. The 301 field goals rank eighth among active kickers

Wilkins 259 field goals as a Ram stands as the Rams' all-time mark and his 1,195 points make him the Rams' all-time scoring leader.

Wilkins' career 82.1 field goal percentage ranks fourth among active kickers and Wilkins' 482 career extra points rank sixth among active kickers and is tied for 22nd all time.

Wilkins has converted 358 consecutive extra points, the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Denver K Jason Elam's streak of 371 consecutive extra point conversions from 1993-2002.

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS (2) – Doug Nussmeier

Marc Bulger (7), Gus Frerotte (14)

Two-time Pro Bowler Marc Bulger starts at QB for the Rams. After earning NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors in Week 10 at New Orleans, Bulger returned to complete 21 of 32 passes for 155 yards and one touchdown, with a 87.4 passer rating at San Francisco last week. Bulger connected with WR Torry Holt for a 3-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter to give the Rams a 7-0 lead. Bulger and Holt have connected for 42 career touchdowns, tied for second most among active quarterback-wide receiver combos. For the second week in a row, Bulger has completed passes to at least seven receivers. At New Orleans in Week 10, Bulger completed a season-high 27 of 33 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns. His 125.0 passer rating was fourth-highest of his career, and the highest since he had a 134.5 passer rating against Washington last season (12/24/06). His 81.1 completion percentage was the best percentage of his career, surpassing his previous high of 77.5 completion percentage at Atlanta (9/19/04). Bulger completed passes to seven receivers, with five receivers catching at least four passes. At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Bulger connected with WR Drew Bennett on a 3-yard touchdown strike, spreading the Rams lead to 34-7, marking Bulger's first multi-touchdown game of the season. The touchdown also marked Bulger's 100th career touchdown pass. In Week 8 vs. Cleveland, Bulger recorded his 25th career 300-yard passing game, only his second after missing two games due to injury. Bulger connected on 24 of 36 passes for 310 yards, the third-most passing yards in Week 8. In Week 2 vs. San Francisco, Bulger had his first 300-yard passing game of the season, completing 24 of 41 passes for a season-high 368 yards and one touchdown. Backing up Bulger, is 14-year veteran **Gus Frerotte**. Frerotte provides valuable experience and is familiar with coach Scott Linehan's offensive system, after spending time with Linehan while he was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Minnesota (2003-04) and Miami (2005). Frerotte started in place of Bulger in Week 5 vs. Arizona 10/7 and in Week 6 at Baltimore 10/14. Frerotte saw brief action vs. Cleveland, temporarily playing for Bulger after Bulger suffered a thumb injury. In his first start, Frerotte completed 24-of-43 passes for 262 yards with three touchdowns and three interceptions.

RUNNING BACKS (5) – Wayne Moses

Steven Jackson (4), Brian Leonard (R), Travis Minor (7), Richard Owens (4), Antonio Pittman (R)

Pro Bowler **Steven Jackson** serves as the Rams feature back. In Week 10 at New Orleans, Steven Jackson

returned from a back injury after the bye week and rushed for 76 yards on 22 carries with a touchdown. Jackson also caught five passes for 24 and added a touchdown pass on a run/pass option inside the five yard line. In Week 3 vs. Tampa Bay 9/23 Jackson posted his first 100-yard rushing performance of the year, rushing 30 times for 115 yards. Jackson returned to the starting lineup in Week 8 vs. Cleveland after being sidelined for four games after suffering a groin injury vs. Tampa Bay. Jackson leads the Rams in 2007 with 442 rushing yards on 122 carries. Rams 2007 second-round draft pick **Brian Leonard** started four games in place of Jackson. In the second start of his young NFL career in Week 5 vs. Arizona 10/7, Leonard rushed for 102 yards on 18 carries, the first 100-yard rushing performance of his career. Leonard also made five receptions for 33 yards. In his first NFL start in Week 4 at Dallas 9/30, Leonard rushed 16 times for 58 yards. The former All-America honoree from Rutgers has made contributions in 2007 as a rusher and as a receiver out of the backfield, rushing 80 times for 286 yards and gaining 151 yards on 22 receptions. Rookie **Antonio Pittman**, joined the Rams on a waiver claim 9/2 after being waived by the New Orleans Saints during final roster cuts. In Week 10 at New Orleans, Pittman had the best game of his young career, gaining 53 yards on seven carries. Pittman nearly scored his first NFL touchdown on a 43-yard rush before being pushed out at the one-yard line. The 43-yard rush was the longest run for the Rams this season. Pittman made his NFL debut vs Arizona, playing on special teams. Pittman made his first NFL carry at Baltimore and finished with five carries for 11 yards. Pittman, a fourth-round draft choice of the Saints out of Ohio State, ranks eighth on the Buckeyes' all-time rushing list despite playing only three seasons. **Travis Minor** joined the Rams in the offseason after spending the previous six seasons with Miami. Minor provides added depth and valuable contributions on special teams. Minor saw his most extensive action on offense this season in Week 6 at Baltimore 10/14, leading the Rams with 40 rushing yards on seven carries. Minor made three tackles on special teams vs. Arizona and also had three tackles against San Francisco in Week 11. Minor is second on the squad with 12 special teams tackles. **FB Richard Owens** joined the Rams after being signed as a free agent 9/12. Owens, a four-year veteran, was waived by Minnesota during final roster cuts and saw his first action as a Ram at Tampa Bay.

WIDE RECEIVERS (7) – Henry Ellard

Drew Bennett (7), Isaac Bruce (14), Marques Hagans (1), Dante Hall (8), Torry Holt (9), Dane Looker (7), Brandon Williams (2)

The Rams' receiving corps is led by **Torry Holt** and **Isaac Bruce**, two of the best wide receivers in the NFL. Holt and Bruce are one of only five pairs of wide receivers who have played together for nine or more seasons in the Super Bowl era. The pair has totaled 1,380 receptions and 20,584 receiving yards with 121 touchdowns since their first season together in 1999. Holt leads the Rams this season with 61 receptions and 755 yards with four

touchdowns. Last week at San Francisco, Holt caught seven passes for 55 yards with one touchdown. With the performance Holt passed former Ram Marshall Faulk for 19th all-time on the NFL's career receptions list with 773. In Week 10 at New Orleans, Holt caught eight passes for 124 yards. With the performance, Holt passed James Lofton for 20th all-time on the NFL's career receptions list. In Week 8 vs. Cleveland 10/28, Holt posted his first 100-yard receiving game, catching six passes for 110 yards with one touchdown. In Week 7 at Seattle 10/21, Holt made eight receptions and passed Hall of Famers Charlie Joiner and Michael Irvin to move into 21st place on the NFL's all-time receptions list with 752 career receptions. With a 26-yard reception on a Gus Frerotte pass in the fourth quarter of the Week 5 matchup vs. Arizona 10/7, Holt surpassed 11,000 career receiving yards, becoming the fastest player in NFL history to reach the milestone, accomplishing the feat in 131 games. Bruce has added 32 receptions for 441 yards, including posting eight receptions for 145 yards in Week 2 vs. San Francisco 9/16. With his three receptions in Week 3 at Tampa Bay 9/23, Bruce surpassed 900 receptions during his career and reached the milestone in only 186 games, becoming the third-fastest player to reach the mark in NFL history. At New Orleans, Bruce scored his first touchdown of the year and tied Art Powell for 17th all-time on the NFL's career touchdown receptions list. Bruce continued to reach milestones at San Francisco, as he passed Rams' wide receivers coach Henry Ellard for sixth on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list. After spending the past six seasons with the Tennessee Titans, **Drew Bennett** joins the Rams after signing as a free agent in the offseason. At New Orleans Bennett caught his second touchdown of the year and finished with 37 yards receiving on four receptions. Vs. Cleveland, Bennett had his best game as a Ram, tying for the team lead with six catches and gained 63 yards receiving. Bennett made his first start as a Ram vs. Arizona, catching two passes for 32 yards including a 16-yard touchdown pass. Bennett made his debut for the Rams in Week 2 vs. San Francisco, posting three catches for 42 yards. Bennett was deactivated for the season opening contest vs. Carolina 9/9 after suffering a thigh injury in practice. Joining Bennett as a new addition to the Rams receiving corps is former Kansas City Chief **Dante Hall**. One of the most dynamic return men in NFL history, Hall entered 2007 with 11 return touchdowns, good for third in NFL history. Hall proved his worth quickly in the 2007, returning the opening kickoff of the second half vs. Carolina for 84 yards. Hall produced his first kick return touchdown as a Ram in Week 4 at Dallas 9/30, taking a Mat McBriar punt back 85 yards for a touchdown. Hall is tied for second in NFL history with 12 total kick return touchdowns (six kickoff returns, six punt returns). Hall missed four games with an ankle injury before returning to the lineup at San Francisco. In his first game back, Hall returned three kickoffs for 57 yards and five punts for 54 yards including a long return of 29 yards.. **Dane Looker** is in his fifth year with the Rams and is an important backup at the receiver position and critical on special teams, serv-

ing as the holder for K Jeff Wilkins. Second-year receiver **Marques Hagans** joined the Rams' 53-man roster this season after spending the 2006 campaign as a member of the practice squad. Hagans, selected by the Rams in the fifth round of the 2006 NFL Draft, is a former college quarterback and also serves as the team's emergency signal-caller. Hagans led all Rams receivers at Baltimore with five catches for 74 yards in only his second NFL game. Hagans made his NFL debut vs. Arizona, entering the game in place of Dante Hall who left the game with an ankle injury. Hagans returned one kickoff for 20 yards and also caught one pass for 11 yards. **Brandon Williams**, who signed with the Rams Oct. 9, five days before the Week 6 game at Baltimore, served as the Rams' primary kick returner in place of Hall. A week after Williams set a personal-best with 112 kickoff return yards and 134 combined return yards (112 kickoff; 22 punt) at Baltimore, Williams continued the trend with his performance at Seattle in Week 7. At Seattle, Williams returned seven kickoffs for 171 yards, both career highs. He also added one fair catch on a punt return.

Randy McMichael starts at tight end for the Rams, after joining the team as a free agent in the offseason from Miami. McMichael spent five seasons with the Dolphins, one of which was spent under the tutelage of then Dolphins offensive coordinator Scott Linehan. McMichael is a receiving threat and an effective blocker from the tight end position. In Week 10 at New Orleans, McMichael caught four passes for 41 yards and a touchdown. The touchdown reception came on an option pass from RB Steven Jackson inside the five yard line. In Week 5 vs. Arizona 10/7, McMichael scored his first touchdown as a Ram on a 29-yard reception in the fourth quarter. In 2007, McMichael has made 24 receptions for 293 yards and two touchdowns. A pair of second-year tight ends, **Joe Klopfenstein** and **Dominique Byrd** provide depth at the position. Klopfenstein has made seven starts this season in either a two-tight end set or at fullback. Aaron Walker who had started in a two-tight end set three times this season was placed on the reserve/injured list before the contest at San Francisco and will miss the rest of the season.

The Rams have used a line that features **Alex Barron** at LT, **Milford Brown** at LG, **Brett Romberg** at C, **Andy McCollum** at RG and **Brandon Gorin** at RT, but injuries have caused even more shuffling, with the Rams using 15 different offensive line combinations this season, including seven different starting lineups. The Rams have played only two games in which the same offensive line that began the game also finished the contest, a Week 5 matchup vs. Arizona 10/30 and the Week 11 matchup at San Francisco. In Week 10 at New Orleans, **Nick Leckey** started at RG in place of McCollum who moved over to C to fill in for Romberg who has suffered injuries to both ankles. Gorin and **Rob Pettiti** shared time at RT. Gorin started the game, but after the first series Gorin began to alternate offensive series with Pettiti, who joined the team two weeks ago. The Rams employed the same line, including rotating Gorin and Pettiti at RT when they faced San Francisco. Fifth-round draft choice **Dustin Fry** spent the beginning of the year on the practice squad but has been signed to the active roster. Fry dressed for the New Orleans and San Francisco contests but did not play. Prior to the San Francisco game, the Rams signed **T Mark LeVoir** from Chicago's practice squad, but LeVoir did not play in the contest. **T Todd Steussie** re-signed with the Rams Tuesday and likely will see action this week vs. Seattle. Steussie was released from the Rams after reaching an injury settlement with the team due to a foot injury suffered in the final pre-season game, but returns to the team after regaining eligibility.

DEFENSE / SPECIAL TEAMS

DEFENSIVE LINE (8) – Brian Baker, Mike Cox

Victor Adeyanju (2), Adam Carriker (R), La'Roi Glover (12), James Hall (8), Trevor Johnson (4), Eric Moore (3) Clifton Ryan (R), Claude Wroten (2).

DE Leonard Little, the Rams' all-time leader in sacks since the statistic was made official in 1982, started the season at left defensive end, but was placed on the reserve/injured list after the bye week with a toe injury. **DE Victor Adeyanju** starts in place of Little. Adeyanju earned his first start of the season at Cleveland in Week 8 filling in for Little. Prior to the Cleveland game, Adeyanju saw action in a backup role. At Baltimore, Adeyanju recovered a fumble by Ravens' QB Kyle Boller and returned it 24 yards to the Baltimore 16 yard line. Adeyanju saw significant playing at Seattle, helping to spell Little who was limited by a toe injury. Adeyanju finished the game with five total tackles. **DE James Hall** starts at right end for the Rams after joining the Rams in the off-season in a trade with Detroit. In his first game as a Ram in Week 1 vs. Carolina 9/9, Hall notched four total tackles, including one tackle for loss. Hall produced four tackles and three quarterback pressures vs. Arizona. At Baltimore, Hall recorded his second sack of the season and finished the game with five tackles. In Week 7 at Seattle 10/21, Hall tied his season-high with five tackles including three solo stops. In Week 8 vs. Cleveland 10/28 Hall again tied his season-high with seven tackles, including five solo tackles. Hall

leads Rams' defensive linemen with 43 takedowns. **DT La'Roi Glover** and **DT Adam Carriker** start along the inside of the Rams' defensive line. Glover, who is in his 12th season, is tied for eighth among active players with 79.0 sacks after posting his second sack of the season last week at San Francisco and totaling eight tackles. Glover made his first sack of the season in Week 7 at Seattle along with four solo tackles and one quarterback pressure. Glover has 36 tackles this season. Glover notched three tackles and had three quarterback pressures at Baltimore. Carriker, the Rams' 2007 first-round draft pick is playing nose tackle and at the 'three-technique' after a standout career at defensive end for Nebraska. In his debut vs. Carolina, Carriker notched three assisted tackles and has 24 total tackles on the year. Carriker made a then career-high five tackles at Baltimore and added one quarterback pressure. Carriker bettered his career high a week later at Seattle, notching six stops and one quarterback pressure. In Week 8 vs. Cleveland 10/28, Carriker notched his first sack of the season by taking down Browns' QB Derek Anderson. Carriker finished the game with four total tackles. Carriker saw some action at his college position of defensive end in the Rams' Week 11 contest at San Francisco and made four tackles. **DT Clifton Ryan** was been called upon to give the Rams' significant playing time after second-year player DT Claude Wroten was suspended for four games. Ryan proved to be ready to contribute as he saw increased action in the Week 2 matchup vs. San Francisco. Ryan led the Rams' defensive lineman with eight total tackles including two sacks and also caused a fumble by 49ers QB Alex Smith, which he recovered himself. Ryan became the first Rams' rookie since Sean Gilber in 1992 to record two sacks in a game. At Baltimore, Ryan led Rams' defensive linemen with seven tackles. Ryan's 37 tackles are second to James Hall for the most among Rams defensive linemen. **Wroten** returned in Week 6 at Baltimore, and made one tackle. At Seattle, Wroten made two tackles and had two quarterback pressures. **DE Trevor Johnson** also provides depth at the defensive end position for the Rams. Johnson, who has made nine tackles in 2007, joined the Rams in the off-season after splitting time between the New York Jets and New Orleans in 2006. In Week 3 at Tampa Bay, Johnson recorded his first sack of the season, dropping Tampa QB Jeff Garcia for an 11-yard loss.

LINEBACKERS (6) – Rick Venturi

Brandon Chillar (4), Quinton Culberson (R), Chris Draft (9), Tim McGarigle (1), Pisa Tinoisamoia (5), Will Witherspoon (6)

Six-year veteran **Will Witherspoon** starts at middle linebacker for the Rams and ranks first on the team with 91 tackles in 2007. In Week 11 at San Francisco, Witherspoon continued his strong play, finishing the game with eight total tackles, including 1.0 sack, and added three passes defended. In Week 10 at New Orleans, Witherspoon was instrumental in the Rams victory as he started at middle linebacker, but also saw action as a rushing defensive lineman during passing situations. Witherspoon finished the game with seven total tackles including 1.0 sack and added

one forced fumble. In Week 7 at Seattle, Witherspoon had a career day, totalling a personal-best 16 tackles including 15 solo tackles. The performance marked Witherspoon's 24th regular season double-digit tackle game and the ninth of his career with the Rams. This season, Witherspoon has had four games with 10 or more tackles. Witherspoon led the team in tackles in 2006, his first season with the team. Starting at strongside linebacker, **Brandon Chillar** had seven tackles and one forced fumble in the Rams' season opener vs. Carolina and posted a season-high eight tackles in Week 3 at Tampa Bay 9/23. Chillar made six tackles and had one quarterback pressure in Week 6 at Baltimore. Chillar's 50 tackles on the year rank fifth on the team. Chillar also sees action on special teams and has five special teams tackles. **Pisa Tinoisamoa**, starts at weakside linebacker and has 75 tackles in 2007, the second-highest total on the team. Last week at San Francisco, Tinoisamoa made eight tackles and had one passed defensed, breaking up a pass attempt to 49ers' TE Vernon Davis in the end zone on the 49ers' final drive. At New Orleans, Tinoisamoa totalled six tackles and notched one interception. Tinoisamo led the Rams with 15 total tackles vs. Arizona, the second-highest total of his career, bettered only by the 18 tackles made at Detroit 12/28/03. Tinoisamoa made an impact at Baltimore with his second consecutive double-digit tackle game. Tinoisamoa finished the game with a team-leading 15 tackles, tying the second-best mark of his career achieved the week prior vs. Arizona. At Seattle, Tinoisamoa posted a third consecutive double-digit tackle game, making 12 total tackles. Tinoisamoa missed the Week 2 matchup vs. San Francisco and the Week 3 contest at Tampa Bay with an ankle injury, but Tinoisamo returned to action in Week 4 at Dallas 9/30, making nine total tackles. The Rams acquired free agent **Chris Draft** in the off-season, and the nine-year veteran from Stanford, is an important backup and special teams player, with the ability to be a starter. Draft has nine tackles on special teams and 19 total tackles on defense in 2007. Draft started at weakside linebacker vs. San Francisco and at Tampa Bay in place of Tinoisamo. Draft made three total tackles on defense and adding one tackle on special teams vs. San Francisco and six tackles at Tampa Bay. 2006 seventh-round draft choice **Tim McGarigle** spent last season on the Rams' practice squad, but has found a home on the team's active roster this season despite being slowed by a hamstring injury in the preseason. McGarigle serves as a backup linebacker and is an important special teams player. McGarigle has four special teams tackles, notching three of the tackles in the contest vs. Arizona. Undrafted rookie free agent **Quinton Culberson** from Mississippi State rounds out the linebacking corps. Culberson was inactive in the season-opener, but saw his first NFL action in Week 2 vs. San Francisco, notching two special teams tackles and earning Special Teams Player of the Week from the team's coaches. Culberson earned his second Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his play at Baltimore in Week 6.

SECONDARY (9) – Willy Robinson, Ron Milus

Oshiomogho Atogwe (3), Ron Bartell (3), Eric Bassey (1),

Fakhir Brown (8), Corey Chavous (10), Tye Hill (2), Todd Johnson (5), Hanik Milligan (5), Jonathan Wade (R).

S Corey Chavous, a 10-year veteran, starts at strong safety for the Rams and provides valuable leadership for a secondary that features only three other players with five or more years of experience. Chavous ranks third on the team with 64 total tackles and notched eight total tackles in each of the Rams first two games. Last week at San Francisco, Chavous led the Rams with 10 tackles including 1.0 sack. Chavous missed the Rams Week 5 game vs. Arizona 10/7 and the Week 6 contest at Baltimore 10/14 with a pectoral injury. In Week 3 at Tampa Bay 9/23 Chavous led the team with 10 tackles including six solo stops. Chavous posted his second consecutive game with 10 tackles in Week 4 at Dallas 9/30, leading the team. Starting free safety **S Oshiomogho Atogwe** got off to a fast start in 2007, leading the team in tackles with 10 in Week 1 vs. Carolina 9/9. Atogwe's 63 tackles are fourth on the team in 2007. Atogwe, who has shown a propensity for making big plays, recorded his first forced fumble and fumble recovery of the season at Tampa Bay. He continued his strong play at Dallas, notching eight tackles and intercepting a Tony Romo pass, returning it 31 yards. At Baltimore, Atogwe forced a fumble and made three tackles. At New Orleans in Week 10, Atogwe added to his takeaway total when he intercepted a Drew Brees pass in the first quarter. Last week at San Francisco, Atogwe was instrumental in the Rams victory, making nine tackles and making a game-clinching interception of 49ers' QB Trent Dilfer as time expired. **CB Tye Hill**, a second-year player out of Clemson, starts at cornerback, but missed four games due to a back injury that was suffered in practice prior to the Week 2 contest vs. San Francisco. Hill returned to the lineup at Baltimore, serving as the team's nickelback before moving into the left cornerback spot after Bartell injured a finger. Hill finished with three tackles and one pass defensed. At San Francisco, Hill notched his first interception of the season and made three tackles and had three passes defensed. **CB Ron Bartell** serves as the team's nickelback, but started at cornerback in the Rams first six games after the absence of Fakhir Brown for four games due to suspension and the injury to Hill. Bartell has impressed notching 40 tackles including 1.0 sack and making one interception. **Brown** returned from his four-game suspension in Week 5 vs. Arizona and made an immediate impact as a starter. Brown made his presence known, leading the secondary with eight solo tackles, two interceptions and a career-high four passes defensed. His two picks led the NFL in Week 5 and marked the first time a Ram had multiple interceptions in a game since Bartell tallied two against Minnesota (12/31/06). Brown made eight tackles at Baltimore and had one pass defensed. In Week 6 at Baltimore, Brown made five tackles and had five passes defensed. **S Todd Johnson**, acquired in the offseason as a free agent, provides valuable experience and is a standout on special teams. In Week 1 vs. Carolina, Johnson shared the Rams' special teams Player of the Week honors with LB Brandon Chillar after Johnson notched two special teams tackles. Johnson's 13 special teams tackles rank first on the team. Johnson's experience

has proven valuable after injuries in the secondary. **S Jerome Carter** was placed on the reserve/injured list after injuring his foot vs. Arizona. With Chavous already out due to a pectoral injury, Johnson moved into the starting lineup at strong safety at Baltimore, and led Rams' defensive backs with nine tackles. 2007 third-round pick **CB Jonathan Wade** contributes as a backup in the secondary this season and is a gunner on the Rams' punt coverage teams. Wade, who earned *Associated Press* All-Southeastern Conference honors while at Tennessee, is tied for fifth on the team with six tackles on special teams and has nine tackles on defense. **CB Eric Basse**y was added to the roster 10/12 from the practice squad and played in his first NFL game at Baltimore, seeing action on special teams. Basseyy has become a gunner on the Rams' punt coverage unit and made two tackles on special teams vs. Cleveland in Week 8. Basseyy bettered that mark at New Orleans, posting three tackles on special teams. Basseyy again added three tackles on special teams in the contest at San Francisco. In only five games, Basseyy has made eight tackles on special teams, the fourth-highest total on the team. **S Hanik Milligan** joined the Rams as a free agent after the bye week 11/5. Milligan entered the NFL as a sixth-round draft choice of the San Diego Chargers in the 2003 NFL Draft and was named to the Pro Bowl as a special teams player after the 2005 season. Milligan posted two special teams tackles at New Orleans in his first game as a Ram.

SPECIAL TEAMS (3) – Al Roberts, Todd Downing

Donnie Jones (4), Chris Massey (6), Jeff Wilkins (14)

K Jeff Wilkins, a 14-year veteran, has proven to be one of the best kickers in the NFL. In Week 10 at New Orleans, Wilkins converted all three of his field goal attempts and all four of his PAT attempts. The 13 points allowed Wilkins to pass Jim Bakken for 19th all-time on the NFL's all-time points list. Wilkins' three field goals gave him 300 for his career and pushed him into a tie with Matt Bahr and Mark Moseley for 18th place all-time for career field goals made. In Week 11 at San Francisco, Wilkins continued to climb the NFL charts. Wilkins converted two-of-two field goal attempts and added one PAT for seven total points. The seven points gave Wilkins 1,388 career points and allowed him to move past Mosely for 18th on the NFL's all-time points list. The 1,388 points rank seventh among active kickers. Wilkins lone field goal at San Francisco broke the tie with Bahr and Mosley for 18th all-time on the NFL's career field goals made list. The 301 field goals rank eighth among active kickers. Wilkins 259 field goals as a Ram stands as the Rams' all-time mark and his 1,195 points make him the Rams' all-time scoring leader. Wilkins' career 82.1 field goal percentage ranks fourth among active kickers and Wilkins' 482 career extra points rank sixth among active kickers and is tied for 22nd all time. Wilkins has converted 358 consecutive extra points, the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Denver K Jason Elam's streak of 371 consecutive extra point conversions from 1993-2002. **LS Chris Massey**, one of the most consistent players at his position, continues long snapping duties, while **P Donnie**

Jones is having a Pro-Bowl caliber year as he is third in the NFL with a 48.9-yard punting average, and is fourth in the NFL (second in the NFC) with a 39.7-yard net average. Last week at San Francisco, Jones punted a season-high nine times for a 44.3 average, with two kicks inside the 20-yard line and a long of 63 yards. The 63-yard punt marks his third-longest punt of the season. The nine punts is the second most in his career, behind his 10 punts vs. New York Jets last season (12/25/06). In Week 7 at Seattle, Jones punted six times for a 52.3-yard average with a career long of 80 yards. The 80-yard punt marked the third longest punt in Rams history, and the longest in the NFL this season. The punt surpassed his then career long in of 66 yards that he set in Week 4 at Dallas. Against Arizona in Week 5, Jones made four punts for a 56.0 average with a long of 60 yards. His 56.0-yard gross average was the best single game average in franchise history, passing Jack Jacobs' 55.8-average at Detroit Sept. 27, 1942. A week earlier at Dallas, he punted eight times for a then career-high 55.3-yard average with a long of 66 yards, two touchbacks and four kicks inside the 20-yard line.
